History, mythology, literature, poetry and the world of art are full of stories and images that speak of the beauty and majesty of the elegant white lily. Often called the “white-robed apostles of hope,” lilies were found growing in the Garden of Gethsemane after Christ’s agony. Tradition has it that the beautiful white lilies sprung up where drops of Christ’s sweat fell to the ground in his final hours of sorrow and deep distress. Churches continue this tradition at Easter time by surrounding their altars and crosses with Easter Lilies to commemorate the resurrection of Jesus and hope of life everlasting.

The pure white lily has long been closely associated with Mary, the Mother of Jesus. In early paintings, the Angel Gabriel is pictured extending to Mary a branch of pure white lilies, announcing that she is to be the mother of the Christ Child. In other paintings, saints are pictured bringing vases full of white lilies to Mary and the infant Jesus. The legend is told that when the Mary’s tomb was visited three days after her burial, it was found empty but for bunches of majestic white lilies. Early writers and artists made the lily the emblem of the Annunciation.

A mark of purity and grace throughout the ages, the regal white lily is a fitting symbol of the greater meaning of Easter. Gracing millions of homes and churches, the flowers embody joy, hope and life.
